IMDA VOLUNTEER PARTNER AWARD (2019-2020)

No.	Organisation Name	Contribution
1	Grab Singapore	Grab Singapore has partnered IMDA to organise the Merdeka Generation Digital Clinics in 2019 to equip seniors with digital skills. Together with IMDA, the MG Digital Clinics benefitted close to 3,500 seniors.
2	Institute of Technical Education (ITE)	The Silver Infocomm Fiesta (SIF) in 2019 was jointly organized with IMDA to bring seniors for a series of IT classes throughout the year to equip them with basic digital skills. More than 100 classes were held at ITE at the SIF and 2,000 seniors were trained on basic digital skills like communication skills, using government digital apps and e-payments.
3	RSVP Singapore The Organisation of Senior Volunteers	RSVP Singapore is one of IMDA's Silver Infocomm Junctions, which serves as a learning hub for seniors to embark on their digital learning journey. They started offering affordable IT courses in 1998 and became the first IMDA appointed SIJ in 2007. They had also co-organised the Silver Infocomm Fiesta 2019 with IMDA to train and help more than 2,000 seniors pick up digital skills.
4	Standard Chartered Bank Singapore	Standard Chartered Bank (Singapore) Limited has been a supportive partner of IMDA's signature programmes. Getting seniors to be digitally ready is a key aspect of the Bank's "Silver Lining" community initiative which focuses on helping the elderly in our rapidly ageing population. Since 2017, over 650 staff volunteers had participated in IMDA's Digital Clinic initiative, Digital Inclusion Festival and the Silver Infocomm Fiesta.
5	Youth Corps Singapore	Youth Corps Singapore (YCS) has worked closely with IMDA to scale the Digital Learning Circles programme in 2020 to equip seniors at the Senior Activity Centres (SAC) with basic digital skills so that the seniors can remain meaningfully connected in the digital society. To date, YCS has deployed 409 youth volunteers at 54 SAC, where these volunteers have engaged more than 1,000 seniors. Prior to that, YCS partnered IMDA in their Digital Clinic programme as well as the Digital Inclusion Festival in 2019.
