Key Milestones of Singaporean Films at the Venice International Film Festival

Singapore's short and feature films have been selected for various sections of competitions over the years since Singaporean filmmaker Eric Khoo's film, Mee Pok Man (1995), was the first Singaporean film to be invited to the Festival as part of the Window on Images section in 1995.

While 2024 will have the first Singapore film "Stranger Eyes" to be selected for the Main Competition (most prestigious), other notable milestones include:
